


2013/2014

Message from the Chief Executive Officer

HARV is committed to working towards a society where adults, children and families can live safely and free from abuse, exploitation and violence. We have had significant challenges over the last year; we continue to operate in an extremely complex commissioning environment and competitive funding arena. Fortunately we predicted some of the changes afoot and spent most of our energy last year in developing a consortium of specialist DV providers across Lancashire. In January 2014 we were awarded the Domestic Abuse Early Support contract and in April we were awarded the high and medium risk victim support contract enabling us to provide consistent services for both adults and children across Lancashire. The Safer Together consortium continues to grow from strength to strength and consists of 9 diverse and specialist organisations.

HARV's activities in the last year have been driven by our strategic plan that focused on sustaining our current service provision whilst building strength across the sector. It is a testament to the accuracy of our strategy and dedication of our staff that we have not only survived but also expanded in some areas of work around the County.

Our successes last year include;

- **Securing funding from Lancashire County Council to deliver Early Intervention services to children and young people experiencing domestic abuse.**
- **Securing funding from Lancashire County Council for adult victims of domestic abuse that are assessed as medium and high risk.**
- **Employing two Lancashire wide coordinators to lead on the above commissions and to develop consistent services across Lancashire.**
- **Consolidating services for children, adults and families.**
- **Working towards CAADA Leading Lights Accreditation, demonstrating our commitment to continuously improving the process that underpins excellent services.**
- **Development of a specialist training programme for agencies and professionals working with victims of domestic abuse.**
- **Working in partnership and advocating for improvement to the response of statutory services via our continued involvement in the Lancashire Safeguarding Children's Board, Safer Lancashire and the Lancashire Domestic Abuse Forum.**

Over the last year there have been continued funding cuts for children assessed as high risk (level 4) on the Lancashire Continuum of Need. We have seen a 28% increase in the demand for our services at a time



where our funding and resources have decreased. Throughout the year the staff team have worked tirelessly to maintain high quality standards and consistency of service and I am thankful to the whole team for their continued enthusiasm, commitment and belief in HARV.

As we move closer to 2015 our commitment to working collectively and in collaboration with other specialist DA providers continues to be a priority in the delivery of a coordinated and consistent response that best meets the needs of vulnerable families.

We will ensure that we have a sustainable cost base and service model that enables us to remain competitive whilst also staying true to our original principles and values, we want to continue to maintain our current portfolio of services and win further work. We will continue to diversify our funding streams by providing services that are built around the needs of our service users.

As a team, we have managed challenges this financial year with resolve and a firm commitment to our values of empowerment, equality and quality.

We will continue to adopt a family centred approach to tackling Domestic Abuse and will increase sustainability of the sector in Lancashire through co coordination of services and implementation of shared outcomes.

About HARV

Our approach:

More than one in four in England (4.8 million) since aged 16 has experienced at least one incident of domestic abuse. Over 20,000 women a week in the UK experience at least one incident of domestic abuse; on average two women a week are murdered at the hands of their current or former partner.

At HARV we provide professional and quality support and services to adults and children experiencing abuse and we will always:

- **Believe victims and make their safety our priority**
- **Support and empower victims to take control of their lives**
- **Recognise and care for the needs of children affected by violence**

We recognise that violence is a violation of women and children's rights, that is the result of an abuse of power and control, and that it is rooted in the historic status of women in the family and in society.

We also recognise that men are victims of domestic abuse. At HARV, we believe that all adults and children have the right to live their lives free from all forms of violence, abuse and exploitation, and that society has a duty to recognise and defend this right. The staff team at HARV work tirelessly every day to ensure that victims of domestic abuse receive the best possible service.



Our Services

Since 1998, HARV have provided a variety of services for vulnerable children and families. In 2014 we were able to provide:

(1) Services for Adults

IDVA Service:

Funded by the national lottery and Lancashire County Council our Independent Domestic Violence Advice Service is one of only forty services in the country that has been awarded the Leading Lights mark of quality. Our IDVAs address the safety of victims at high risk (a score of 10+ on the CAADA DASH risk assessment) of harm from intimate partners, ex partners or family members to secure their safety and the safety of their children.

Working from the point of crisis, our IDVAs are pro active in implementing safety plans, which address immediate safety, including practical steps to protect themselves and their children. These plans will include actions from the Multi Agency Risk Assessment Conference (MARAC), as well as sanctions and remedies available through the criminal and civil courts, housing options and services available via other organisations. IDVAs support and work over the short to medium term to put clients on the path to long term safety. All IDVAs at HARV receive specialist accredited training and hold a Home Office recognised national qualification. In the last 12 months, our IDVA service provided direct support to 1127 adults, 561 of which were identified as being high risk. A high risk victim is best defined as someone who is at risk of serious harm or homicide. 168 of clients were male and 220 were referred and supported by HARV at MARAC.

Medium and Low Risk Support:

Service users that are identified within this risk category are provided with weekly one to one support and can access group sessions. 566 individuals were referred into this service.

(2) Sports Programme:

Our Fit, Free and Fabulous project was funded by Sports England and provided sports and fitness opportunities to service users as part of their recovery plan, enabling women living in disadvantaged communities of Hyndburn to participate in sport and physical activity on a regular basis. The programme ended in 2014 after three years of successful delivery. 443 women participated in the programme; activities included swimming, salsa, zumba, gym sessions, circuits, boxing, boxercise, self defence, multi sports, running, cycling and walking. A weekly coffee morning, health education sessions and social activities including outdoor education activities also took place.

“It kept me sane at a time when I thought I was going mad, My life was so chaotic, i needed the routine and commitment of attending something regularly. I know HARV will always be there for me.”

Counselling Service:

At HARV we have a team of student counsellors who provide a varied range of therapeutic interventions that address a variety of issues related to a client's experience of domestic abuse. Interventions include increasing self-esteem and confidence, reducing anxiety, depression and suicidal or self-injurious behaviour. Our therapeutic support is underpinned by different theoretical models and utilise different intervention methods, these include Cognitive Behaviour Therapy (CBT), Neuro Linguistic Programming (NLP) and PC (Person Centred).

In 2013–2014 there were 132 separate counselling contracts with 137 hours of support provided.

(3) Services for Families

Total Family Domestic Abuse Service:

Our TF service provided support to the victim, the perpetrator of violence and any children affected. HARV's TF service ended in December 2013 after an 18 month pilot as a result of funding cuts. The initiative enabled us to explore the potential for coordinating services around the needs of the family rather than individuals in order to secure better outcomes for all. The service accounted for whole families circumstances and explores the potential for family based interventions within a domestic abuse service.

At HARV the model we delivered included safety support and group intervention for the victim, one to one support for children and young people, and a positive change programme for the perpetrator. Service users are consistently risk assessed and outcomes / issues are discussed in Team around the Family (TAF) meetings and Multi Agency Risk Assessment Conferences.

Group Intervention

At HARV we have two group rolling programmes . The Freedom programme and the Recovery programme. The Freedom programme is for any woman who wishes to learn more about the reality of domestic

violence and abuse. It is a free 12 week rolling programme, which means that participants can join at any point. The aim is to help participants to understand the beliefs held by abusers and in doing so, recognise which of these beliefs they have shared. It also illustrates the effects of domestic violence on children and assists to recognise future abusers, Mr Wrong and Mr Right. The overall aim is to help women gain self esteem and the confidence to improve the quality of their lives and to realise that this is not only possible but a basic human right. In the last year 86 women completed the Freedom Programme.

The Recovery programme has been developed by Sue Penna to assist any individual or agency working with women who have experienced domestic abuse/violence and are in a position to take part in a group (not living with the perpetrator or perpetrator is on a recognised programme) designed to assist each of them in looking at ways to develop positive lifestyle coping strategies. Any individual experiencing the isolation, exhaustion, humiliation, degradation and threats that are part of the abusive behaviour will encounter difficulties. The aim of the group is not to hold women responsible for what happened to her, or blame her for those actions or decisions taken at the time of the abuse that may in retrospect be found not to have been safe. Rather the purpose of the group is to recognise the tremendous effort the woman has made in keeping her and her family as safe as possible, while helping her to acknowledge that coping strategies used under duress may not be helpful in her recovery and development of a new life free from abuse.

What is abuse?

Introduction to self esteem

Self esteem and coping

The consequences on our psychological well being

The affects of abuse on children and on parenting skills

Affirmations and the power of positive self talk

Anger and conflict

Assertiveness

Setting goals

Healthy relationships

Last year 15 Women completed the Recovery Programme.

Services for Children and Young People (CYP)

In 2013, HARV had 3 full time members of staff, from April 2013 to March 2014 a number of changes occurred within the C and YP's team as a result of reduced funding, a three year BBC Children in Need grant came to an end at the same time as a three year Comic Relief grant. Children's

Trust and Positive Activities funding also ceased, leaving the team with no core funding for work with C and YP.

Funding from Lloyds Foundation enabled us to continue providing a skeleton service to the most vulnerable children. In January, in collaboration with our Safer Together Partners, we won an early intervention tender with Lancashire County Council. The application was lead and written by HARV.

Early Intervention

The early intervention domestic abuse services enable us to work with C and YP that are at level 2 and 3 on the Lancashire Continuum of Need (CON). These are children that as a result of their experience of domestic abuse are identified as having additional support needs and/or complex support needs.

Our Early Intervention Officers at HARV provide weekly 1-1 support in school, Group support in the form of the Recovery or Helping Hands programme, positive activities and advocacy at multi agency meetings.

From January to March, 15 C and YP attended the Children and Young Peoples Recovery programme and 18 C and YP received 1-1 support.

Our services aim to identify, support and safeguard children, reduce the impact that domestic abuse has on children, improve outcomes and safety, improve services responses, empower C and YP within the safeguarding process and enable the strengthening of families.

Children and Young Peoples IDVA

Additional to the Early Intervention service our Children's IDVA service provided 25 young people with support from April 2013 until August 2013. Our Children's IDVA service provided support to children that were assessed as high risk and whose mother was being support via the MARAC process.

This IDVA also provided essential support to 16-18 year olds that were in their own intimate relationships and experiencing abuse. This service was able to provide support to children on Child Protection or Child in Need plans and worked in partnership with Children's Social Care.

"What he did really scared me, but I just thought it was normal, he told me it was normal, it wasn't normal" (Child aged 8)

"I felt heartbroken and embarrassed about what was happening, there were other young people at HARV who felt the same way and this somehow made it so much easier to deal with" (YP aged 13)

Our Services (cont'd)

Christmas Toy Distribution

Every year, thanks to Rock FM, The Rotary Club of Accrington, The Salvation Army in Clitheroe, Accrington Lions, Tesco's and St Pauls Church we get a delivery of new toys to distribute. Last year over a 100 vulnerable families benefited from toys. We also save toys so throughout the year we can give them to children for their birthdays or for completing a piece of work.

We are also able to provide families in our Safe house, who are not able to bring their children's toys with them as a result of fleeing domestic abuse. These toys make a huge difference to so many families at Christmas time and throughout the year.

Positive Activities

We have been unable to take C and YP on many trips this year as a result of funding cut backs. We have however managed to provide some activities; these include going out for a meal, bowling and a residential.

Film

In the summer of 2013 Young People produced their own film about their experiences of domestic abuse 'You really hurt me'. This proved to be a huge success and is being used by the Lancashire Children's Safeguarding Board as part of their safeguarding training and CAADA in their Young Peoples training. The production was supported by soap star Dominic Brunt who plays Emmerdales vet Paddy, who was brought up in Accrington.

Safe House

The Safe House provides shelter for local families who are fleeing domestic abuse. Opened on the 1st of November 2013 this is an initiative between Hyndburn Borough Council, Your Housing and HARV.

The Safe House can provide temporary accommodation for up to four families at any one time; they are provided with a safe and supportive environment and are able to stay up to 6 months, where after this period they will be supported to live independently. In the last year five families have accessed the Safe House.

Training, Support and Collaboration

HARV is a key partner in a number of Local and County Wide strategies, successes includes the ongoing development of the 'Safer Together'

consortium, a partnership of nine domestic abuse providers across Lancashire.

The CEO of HARV is also the voluntary sector representative on the Lancashire Safeguarding Children's Board (LSCB), is the current chair of the Lancashire Domestic Abuse Forum and the vice chair of the VCFS reference group.

We currently provide domestic abuse and safeguarding training on behalf of the LCSB across the region. In recent months private training and development contracts have been developed with Children's Social Care, Children's Centres, Schools and other VCFS organisations.

In 2013/14, 98 individuals attended HARV's specialist Domestic Abuse and Safeguarding training.

In January 2014 the Safer Together Consortium won the Domestic Abuse Early Intervention Contract to deliver services for children across the County, In April we were also awarded the medium and high risk contract to provide IDVA services in East and Central Lancashire. Our strategy for the next three years is to continue to develop and strengthen partnership work.

Additional Areas

Practice Education

At HARV we have an internal practice educator who enables learning and professional development within the organisation. Over the last year we have been able to support 7 MA and BA social work students from the University of Central Lancashire (UCLAN) and Manchester Metropolitan University (MMU).

Our practice educator takes overall responsibility for students learning and assessment, utilising information for their assessment and other sources. She makes recommendations to the course examination board about student's competence in relation to the professional capabilities framework.

Legal Advice

HARV works in partnership with a number of local solicitors who provide weekly legal surgeries for service users. Over the last year 227 individuals have accessed surgeries at our centre.

Our Services (cont'd)

Research

HARV are currently involved in the IMPROVE research project, that provides an overview of interventions aimed at improving outcomes for children and young people exposed to domestic violence: Systematic review, evidence synthesis and research recommendations.

Dr Joanne Westwood and Professor Nicky Stanley led on the evaluation of HARVs Children and Young Peoples IDVA service and produced a three year service evaluation to determine the impact of children's advocacy intervention across several outcome measures.

Citizens Advice

In partnership with the Citizens Advice Bureau, we have been providing weekly drop in support at HARVs centre: Providing free, independent, confidential and impartial advice to everyone on their rights and responsibilities. Most sessions include benefits advice and support and debt management.


Food Bank

Community Solutions have been providing our vulnerable service users with weekly Food parcels.

Affordable warmth


In partnership with Homewise and other charities we secured funding to provide a hot weekly meal, winter coats and bedding for some of our most vulnerable families. 216 families benefitted from this scheme.

- 220 cases supported at MARAC
- 47 CAFs completed
- 1127 safety plans completed
- No domestic abuse homicides
- 90% living violence free after 6 months




Clients reported outcomes: Risk Reduction


